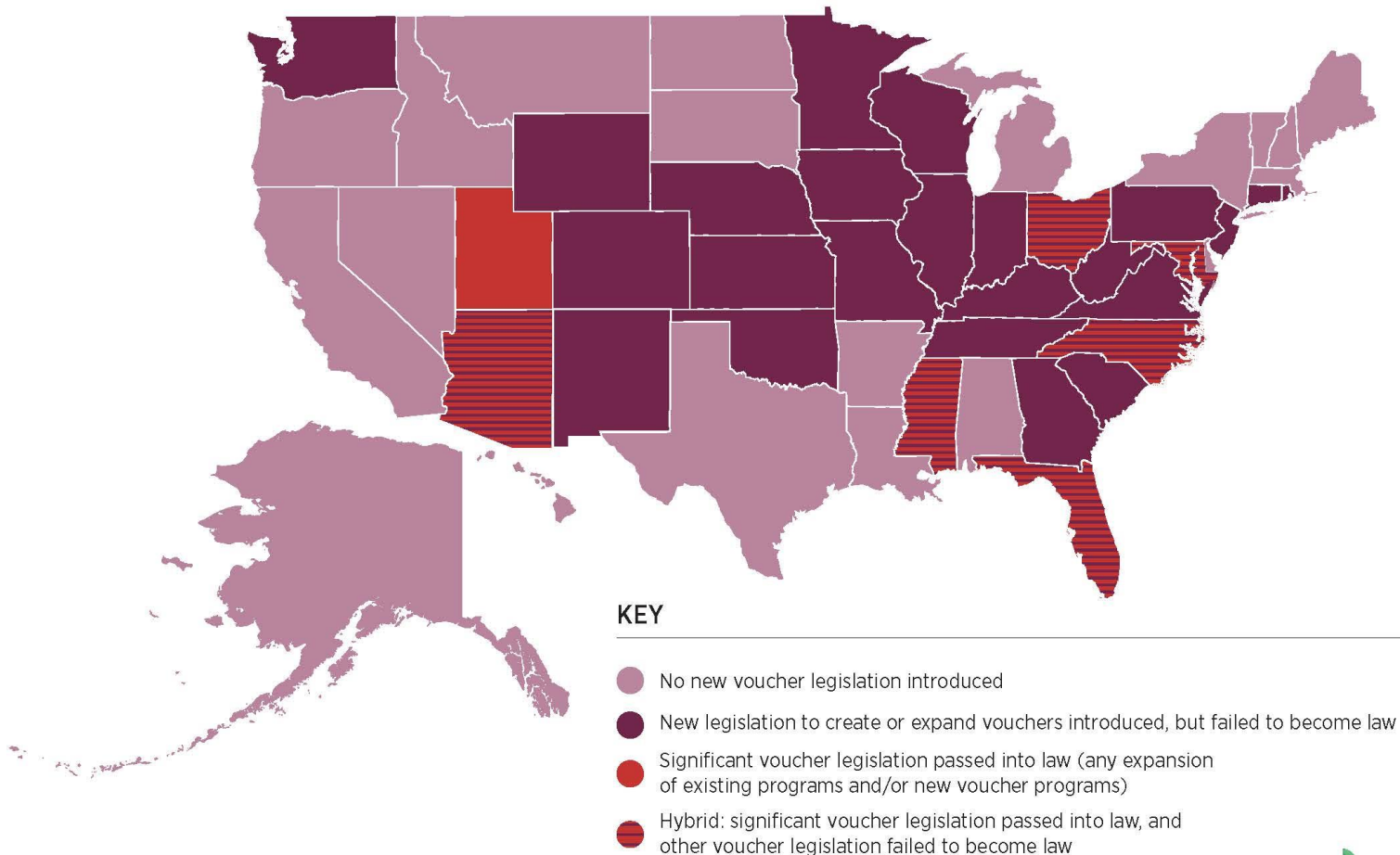


PUBLIC FUNDS PUBLIC SCHOOLS

2020 PRIVATE SCHOOL VOUCHER* LEGISLATION



*Voucher legislation on this map includes bills about traditional private school vouchers, education savings account (ESA) vouchers, and tax credit vouchers, as well as other measures, such as individual tax credits, that would divert public funds to private education. This map does not include bills about 529 savings accounts.

The map above of the United States is color coded, with each state falling into one of four categories:

The first category, colored light purple, is “no new voucher legislation introduced.” The states in this category are: Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, California, Delaware, Hawaii, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Montana, New Hampshire, Nevada, New York, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, and Vermont.

The second category, colored dark purple, is “new voucher legislation to create or expand vouchers introduced, but failed to become law.” The states in this category are: Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

The third category, colored red, is “significant voucher legislation passed into law (any expansion of existing programs and/or new voucher programs).” The only state in this category is Utah.

The fourth category, which is striped red and dark purple, is “hybrid: significant voucher legislation passed into law, and other voucher legislation failed to become law.” The states in this category are Arizona, Florida, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, and Ohio.
